ARMED FORCES DAY PARADE



Your Executive Committee and Trustees have been busy with monthly meetings and attending various activities and events.

Camp 64 Myerstown has officially closed, and the Camp's investment monies were transferred into the National Camp portfolio. This was the Order's oldest Camp in existence, and only had one Camp member remaining.

The National Convention location and date had to be changed due to a conflict at the original hotel site. It will now be held September 29 and 30 at the Morgantown Holiday Inn.

Motion made and approved to again sponsor a student to attend the Pennsylvania Free Enterprise Week sessions at a cost of \$695.

Motion made and approved to preserve and reframe the original certificate of shares of the POS of A that was used to raise monies to preserve Washington's Headquarters. The certificate is currently on display at Patriot's Hall. The cost in the motion is not to exceed \$250.

In anticipation of numerous events that were held at Patriot's Hall, several additional renovations were completed. A new kitchen was installed, the bathrooms were painted and a urinal removed, and an outside clean-up day was held. Two new storm doors were installed, and two more will be done in the near future. Also new toilets may be installed in both the men's and women's restrooms. A motion was made and approved for the National Camp to pay for the kitchen flooring at a cost of \$146.27.

Motion made and approved for the National Camp to pay for the bulk mail postage for the Valley Forge Appeal mailing as their donation to the appeal, at a cost of \$132.
